# LESSON ONE: OUR IDENTITY

Conflict Resolution Skills: teamwork, identity, empathy

### **Curriculum Expectations Covered:**

- Social Studies A.1.1; 2.4; 3.5; 3.8
- Learners will:
  - explain how various features contribute to identity and image of a country by examining and analysing photographs
  - interpret and analyse information and evidence using historic and contemporary photographs
  - identify and describe fundamental elements of Canadian identity by creating their own identity crest

# **LESSON TWO: CANADIAN COMMUNITIES**

Conflict Resolution Skills: communication, migration

### **Curriculum Expectations Covered:**

- Social Studies A.1.2; 2.3; 3.1
- Learners will:
  - evaluate contributions that various ethnic and/or religious groups have made to Canadian identity by analysing landmarks and cultural practices in their own community.
  - analyse and construct print and digital maps as part of their investigations into different perspectives on the historical and/or contemporary experience of communities in Canada by creating their own map that highlights significant spaces in their own community.
  - identify the main reasons different peoples came to Canada by analysing migration patterns.

## OBJECTIVE

Learners will develop conflict resolution strategies and justice awareness via the Grade Six Ontario Curriculum.

# **LESSON THREE: CONFLICT & CHANGE**

Conflict Resolution Skills: teamwork, the role of change in conflict

## **Curriculum Expectations Covered:**

- Social Studies A.2.1; 2.2; 2.5; 3.7
- Learners will:
  - formulate questions to guide investigations into different perspectives on the historical and/or contemporary experience of Canadians by researching two or more distinct communities in Canada.
  - gather and organize information from a variety of primary and secondary sources using photographs, news articles.
  - evaluate evidence and draw conclusions about perspectives on the historical and contemporary experience of two or more distinct communities in Canada by creating tableaus or a dramatic skit that demonstrates change in Canadian communities.
  - describe significant changes within their own community in Canada by reflecting on changes they have experienced in their community.

# **LESSON FOUR: CHANGING COMMUNITIES**

Conflict Resolution Skills: power, identity, social and economic disparity

### **Curriculum Expectations Covered:**

Social Studies A.3.3; 3.5; 3.6 Learners will:

- identify various types of communities that have contributed to the development of Canada by analysing where resources are distributed in Canada.
- describe interactions between communities in Canada, including relationships between newcomers and groups already in the country, by researching historical and contemporary resources for new Canadians and socio-political attitudes towards new Canadians.
- identify key differences between two or more communities in Canada by analysing and reflecting on photographs of social, economic, and structural aspects of two Canadian communities.

# LESSON FIVE: OUR STORY, CANADA'S STORY

Conflict Resolution Skills: teamwork, power, communication, cultural identity, empathy, diversity

### **Curriculum Expectations Covered:**

Social Studies A.2.6; 3.5; A.2.4; 3.2; 3.4 Learners will:

- communicate the results of their inquiries using appropriate vocabulary and formats by creating a social media post about Canadian identity, and their own identity.
- describe interactions between communities in Canada by reflecting on features of Canadian identity in different social and cultural contexts with a partner.
